## PROGRAM NARRATIVE

### A. PROBLEM DEFINITION

Domestic violence crosses ethnic, racial, age, national origin, sexual orientation religious and socioeconomic lines. Domestic Violence is defined as a pattern of behavior used to establish power and control over another person through fear and intimidation, often including the threat or use of violence. Each year United States women experience about 4.8 million intimate partner related physical assaults and rapes. Family violence Prevention Fund (FPFV) during 2009 15.5 million U.S. children live in families in which partner violence occurred at least once in the past year and 7 million children in families in which severe partner violence occurred. Each year, Louisiana women experience about 90,079 intimate partner related physical assaults. The cost of intimate partner violence still exceeds 5.8 billion including 4.1 billion direct healthcare expenses, with more than 900 million in lost productivity and 900 million in lifetime earnings. Louisiana was ranked first in the nation with a homicide rate of 2.53 per 100,000 females murdered by males nearly double the national average of 1.30 per 100,000 females. Vast majority of victims were female (70%) and the vast majority of perpetrators were male (80%) age wise the majority victims (63%) and perpetrators (66%) were 18-40 years of age. Domestic violence is a serious and ongoing problem, and leading the nation in Domestic .

Turning Point Battered Women's Program (Turning Point) has a 28-year professional history of serving victims of domestic violence in region VI. Because domestic violence is a major cause of injury and death to women, Turning Point is committed to on-going advocacy, education, and counseling as principle strategies to assure victims and their children achieve safety, autonomy, and justice. Residential and non-residential services provide counseling, advocacy (individual and systemic), and education. Turning Point staff provide a proactive approach to service provision including direct survivor-driven services to victims ranging from counseling, safety planning, education, and advocacy. The domestic violence program coordinates trainings for law enforcement, judicial agencies, volunteers, professional agencies, and the community at large to increase the awareness of domestic violence. Turning Point participates in networking with coalitions, individuals, agencies and organizations committed to the shared mission of eliminating personal and societal violence against women and children. From July 2008 to 2009, we served more than 1202 victims; we expect even greater numbers in the future through the efforts of Turning Point's outreach staff to increase awareness and education in the rural underserved parishes of Region VI. Because domestic violence, including but not limited to safe shelter, direct support services, legal advocacy, community education, training for service providers, and coordination of domestic violence work throughout our service area.

Community awareness needed in more community town halls, in rural areas schools healthcare, college campus, and young adults from the ages to 18-25 year. Gap identified through population that was served through the program that gradually started coming through for services and then getting referrals from health care, OeS, law enforcement, court system. Need created by this gap in services is more referrals, more need to educate on Domestic violence, more need to reach rural population court system, and the continue need to inform the community on the statistics of domestic violence and homicide to let them know that domestic violence has an alarming societal problem but to also realize that domestic violence is a silent killer.
